Dr. Beeler, a Clinical Associate Professor at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, College of Nursing, commenced her nursing journey by earning an ADN from East Tennessee State University. Subsequently, she pursued a BSN from the same institution and went on to earn an MSN with a concentration in Nursing Administration from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. Her career in nursing leadership spans various roles in acute care settings, including unit manager and director across two hospitals within a large Healthcare System. Additionally, she obtained a Post-Master's Certification as a Family Nurse Practitioner.

Baccalaureate Program Chair, Associate Professor of Nursing

Dr. Angel Boling is an Associate Professor of Nursing and has served as the Baccalaureate Program Chair since 2018 at Baptist Health Sciences University. She obtained her Associate Degree in Nursing from Northwest Community College, Bachelor's Degree in Nursing from University of Mississippi Medical Center, and her Master's Degree in Nursing Education with a specialization in Critical Care from the University of Memphis. She obtained her Doctorate of Philosophy in Nursing from the University of Missouri-Kansas City with a research focus

in simulation and interprofessional education. Her nursing career expands 28 years where she began her bedside nursing career working 15+ years in a Level 1 Trauma and Burn Center and served in a variety of roles that include bedside nurse, preceptor, charge nurse, clinical unit educator, and leadership/management positions. She begin working as a clinical adjunct faculty in 2004 and transitioned to a full time faculty position in 2011 at Baptist Health Sciences University. In her current role as program chair, she serves in both administrative and teaching positions within the BSN program, as well as assisting with simulation experiences for the Acute Gerontology Acute Care Doctoral program.

Her passion and research continues to be in examining the use of simulation as a teaching modality to enhance interprofessional communication/collaboration in health science programs, as well as integration of simulation in the didactic setting to enhance critical thinking and clinical judgment skills for undergraduate nursing students.

Lindsay Bouchard, DNP, PMHNP-BC

University of Arizona Interim Advanced Nursing Practice and Science Division Vice Chair and DNP Program Director

Dr. Bouchard has been a full-time faculty member at the University of Arizona for 12 years and currently serves as the DNP Program Director and Vice Chair of the Advanced Nursing Practice and Science Division, leading over 50 faculty. Her nursing career began by obtaining a direct-entry master's degree from McGill University, during which she developed a strengths-based approach to caring for patients with severe mental illness. In her subsequent work as a nurse, preceptor, and Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, she has worked in multidisciplinary teams caring for psychiatric patients in inpatient and outpatient settings. Associate Professor


